The Power of Presence: Why Continuous Farmer Engagement Matters in BGF's Agroforestry Model

At Better Globe Forestry (BGF), our work spans both commercial plantations and community-based agroforestry systems in semiarid regions, often underutilised landscapes rich in untapped potential. Our plantations are based in Nyongoro and Kiambere, while our agroforestry model is implemented in Kenya's 7 Forks region, Uganda's Dokolo District, and most recently through a 10,000tree pilot project within the Kiambere plantation. Over the years, this model has transformed landscapes and livelihoods through an inclusive approach that views farmers not as passive recipients but as active co-creators of sustainable land-use practices. We believe that the success of agroforestry extends beyond planting trees; it begins with presence. Sustainable impact depends on consistent, hands-on engagement with farmers.

Why Presence Matters: Continuous farm visits and regular interactions are the backbone of a thriving agroforestry model. These touchpoints build trust, reinforce accountability, and cultivate a strong sense of ownership among farmers. When support is timely and consistent, farmers are more confident in adopting, adapting, and sustaining the best practices introduced. This isn't just about planting trees; it's about growing relationships that support long-term success.

Building Confidence and Preventing Setbacks: Continuous monitoring allows BGF to track progress, address challenges early, whether it's misinformation, poor planting techniques, or the temptation to harvest trees prematurely. Regular farm visits reassure farmers that expert support is always within reach, boosting their confidence and commitment to the program.

This hands-on approach leads to higher tree survival rates, improved farm productivity, and stronger community resilience. Most importantly, it reinforces the long-term value of tree planting in areas facing increasing environmental and economic pressures.

Strengthening Communities Through Consistent Engagement:

Regular interaction ensures that farmers feel supported and equipped to manage their trees, crops, and land effectively, even during dry seasons or difficult harvests. This approach also helps preserve traditional knowledge, promotes local innovation, and nurtures environmental stewardship. Sustainable change is not a one-time intervention; it's a journey. And what makes our model work is not just the trees we plant, but the relationships we build.

Kenya Launches REDD+ Registry

A Historic Step and a Critical Role for Bridge-Builders Like Better Globe Forestry

On 28th July 2025, Kenya made history by launching Africa's first National REDD+ Registry, ushering in a new era of transparency, accountability, and global alignment in carbon market governance. Developed with Conservation International, the digital platform tracks the full lifecycle of carbon credits and aligns with Article 6 of the Paris Agreement.

Better Globe Forestry (BGF) attended the launch as a guest of the Kenya Association of Manufacturers (KAM), representing the Timber Sector, affirming the private sector's growing role in nature-based solutions and green finance. The registry, developed with support from Conservation International, is a digital platform for tracking the full lifecycle of carbon credits from REDD+ and other forestry projects. Key features include:

- Carbon credit issuance, transfer, and retirement tracking.
- Aligned with Article 6 of the Paris Agreement.

• Nesting of site-level projects within national emission baselines. This launch formalises Kenya's carbon credit system and sets the bar high for environmental integrity in Africa. The British High Commissioner, Neil Wigan, reaffirmed the UK's £200 million green investment pledge to support climate adaptation, clean energy, and nature-based solutions in Kenya. This funding, under the UK-Kenya Strategic Partnership 2025–2030, positions Kenya as a global leader in climate action and opens a channel for private sector implementation partnerships.
